Purpose

To engage Community leaders to:

- Raise awareness of the BC Assembly of First Nations, Union of BC Indian Chiefs and First Nations Summit Resolutions endorsing the creation of the Indigenous Skills Training and Employment Committee;
- Ensure that perspectives of the Communities are considered during this Exploratory Phase for the Committee;
- Identify strategies to improve skills, training and employment activities in communities.

Context


- March 2017 BC Chiefs and Councilors met with ESDC to discuss the future of ASETS. Chiefs recommended creation of a "Steering Committee table to address joint decision making at the Federal and Provincial level".
- March 2019 the BC Assembly of First Nations, the Union of BC Indian Chiefs and the First Nations Summit passed resolutions in February and March 2019 to establish this Committee.
- July 2019 Canada and BC expressed interest in exploratory discussions.
- November 2019 The Province of BC passed Bill 41 the Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous People Act (DRIPA) in alignment with the UN Declaration.
- January 2020 Our Gathering to engage Community leaders for input.

Scope

The Proposed Committee will:

- Be advisory with a strategic focus to improve socio-economic conditions for First Nations in BC.
- Complement existing Tripartite structures.
- Focus on clients needing additional supports to achieve employment goals. Employment and training is a continuum, based on individual needs and aspirations, and evolves over time.
- Develop a skills, training and employment framework to better support the well-being of individuals, families and communities.
